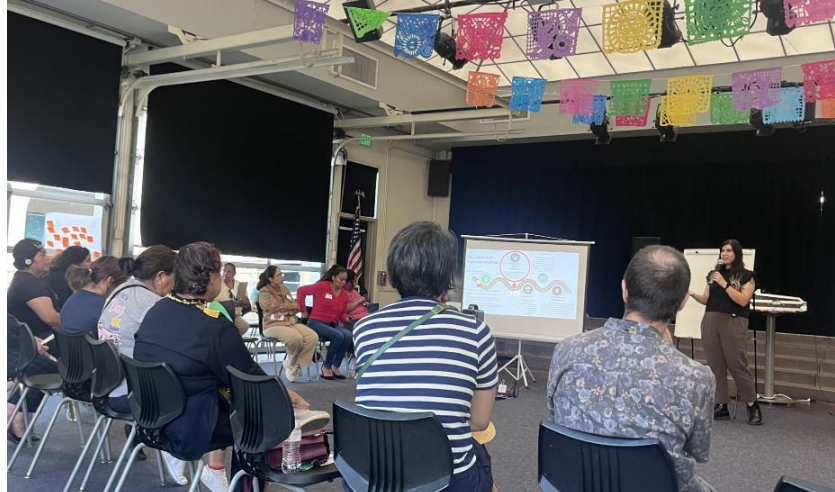




What is the Community Resilience Centers (CRC) Program?

The CRC Program:

- Funds the planning, construction, and retrofit of community resilience centers across California's diverse communities.
- Advances communities' capacity to plan for long-term resilience and acute emergencies.
- Encourages meaningful engagement, cross-sectoral collaboration, community-based partnerships, and shared governance and decision-making models.
- Mitigates the public health impacts of extreme heat and other emergency situations exacerbated by climate change.
- Prioritizes projects located in and benefiting under-resourced, rural, unincorporated, and Tribal communities across geographically diverse regions in the state of California.

From extreme heat to wildfires, recent climate events and public health emergencies impact every part of California. The best available projections anticipate that these climate impacts will intensify. In the face of these challenges, strengthening resilience requires investments in both physical and social infrastructure. In addition to climate resilience activities, community resilience builds ongoing social cohesion, trust, and networks.

What activities does the CRC Program Fund?

The CRC Program funds Planning and Implementation Grants to advance neighborhood resilience centers that provide shelter and resources during climate emergencies. It also supports year-round community services and programming.

How much funding is available?

Approximately \$55 million is available for Round 2. The funding is from the Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparedness, and Clean Air Bond Act of 2024, commonly known as the "Climate Bond" (Proposition 4).

Who is eligible to apply?

In Round 2, Lead Applicants must be a public or local agency, nonprofit organization, special district, joint powers authority, Tribe, public utility, local publicly owned utility, or mutual water company.

Priority Communities

All communities are eligible for CRC Program funds. However, in alignment with the Climate Bond's funding goals, Round 2 of the CRC Program will prioritize investments in the communities most burdened by environmental, socioeconomic, and health inequities. Priority communities include under-resourced (low-income, disadvantaged, and severely disadvantaged) communities, Tribes, rural communities, and unincorporated communities.

How do you apply?

- **May 29, 2026:** Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) released
- **July 2, 2026:** Applications open via the online platform Submittable
- **Summer 2026:** Application Period
 - Complete application for appropriate grant type by due date stated in NOFA
 - Applications due via Submittable
- **Fall and Winter 2026-27:** Application review
 - SGC will notify applicants who are deemed ineligible or fail threshold review
 - Notified applicants with incomplete applications will have up to three days to submit missing documentation
 - Final applications and requested materials due via Submittable
 - Top-scoring Implementation Grant applicants invited for an interview
- **Spring 2027:** Awards

Transformative Climate Communities

Community-led climate solutions for equitable transformation



The Transformative Climate Communities (TCC) Program funds community-led development and infrastructure projects that achieve major environmental, health, and economic benefits in California's most disadvantaged communities. TCC empowers the communities most impacted by pollution to choose the strategies and projects best suited to achieve their community vision and enact transformational change. All with data-driven milestones and measurable outcomes.

Since 2018, the California Strategic Growth Council (SGC) has awarded over \$424 million in TCC grants to 37 of the most disadvantaged communities in California through a competitive process. TCC is funded through the State General Fund and cap-and-trade dollars at work through California Climate Investments.

WHAT DOES TCC FUND?

TCC's unique, place-based strategy for reducing greenhouse gas emissions is designed to catalyze collective impact through a combination of community-driven climate projects in a single neighborhood. Projects must reduce greenhouse gas emissions significantly over time, leverage additional funding sources, and provide health, environmental and economic benefits to the community.

Project examples include, but are not limited to:

- » Affordable and sustainable housing developments
- » Transit stations and facilities
- » Electric bicycle and car share programs
- » Solar installation and energy efficiency
- » Water-energy efficiency installations
- » Urban greening and green infrastructure
- » Bicycle and pedestrian facilities
- » Recycling and waste management
- » Health equity and well-being projects
- » Brownfields redevelopment
- » Community microgrids
- » Indoor air pollution reduction

WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO APPLY?

A diverse range of community, business and local government stakeholders must form a Collaborative Stakeholder Structure to develop a shared vision of transformation for their community. This may include:

- » Community-based organizations
- » Local governments
- » Nonprofit organizations
- » Philanthropic organizations and foundations
- » Faith-based organizations
- » Coalitions or associations of nonprofits
- » Community development finance institutions
- » Community development corporations
- » Joint powers authorities
- » California Native American tribes

HOW ARE OUTCOMES TRACKED AND MONITORED?

An evaluation team will monitor and report project greenhouse gas emissions reductions for awarded applicants using a quantification methodology certified by the California Air Resources Board. The evaluation team also will work with grantees to track co-benefit indicators based on the program's health, environmental, and economic goals.

Extreme Heat and Community Resilience Program

Round 2 of EHCRP will award \$27.5 million in funding to infrastructure projects that bring lasting, positive change to communities. The program aims to support efforts that combine community services and physical improvements to protect the health of Californians who are most vulnerable to extreme heat. This second round of funding comes from the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund (GGRF) and California's Climate Bond (Proposition 4).

Program Overview (Tribes)



About SALC

The Sustainable Agricultural Lands Conservation Program (SALC) protects agricultural lands and lands utilized for the cultivation of traditional foods, herbal medicine, fibers, and dyes from conversion to more greenhouse gas intensive uses while promoting smart growth, ensuring open space remains available, and supporting healthy agricultural and tribal food systems, and resulting food security.

KEY TERMS

Agricultural land: For the purposes of this program, agricultural land includes both cultivated and non-cultivated lands that support an agricultural use.

Agricultural use: For the purposes of this program, agricultural uses include the cultivation and tillage of the soil; dairying; the production, cultivation, growing, and harvesting of any agricultural commodity including viticulture, apiculture, or horticulture; the raising of livestock, fish, or poultry; and, when conducted or led by tribes or their members, gathering and activities that promote healthy trees, shrubs, and perennial forbs for the cultivation of traditional foods, herbal medicine, fibers (such as basketry material), and dyes.

Tribal Applicants

Federally recognized California Native American tribes, non-federally recognized California Native American tribes on the contact list maintained by the California Native American Heritage Commission, and 501(c)(3) nonprofits directly associated with a California Native American tribe and with a majority Native American board are eligible to apply for all three SALC Grant types. SALC Grant Types

Planning Grants

support the development of local and regional land use policies and economic development strategies to protect critical agricultural land.

Maximum grant amount
\$500,000.

January - All Pre-proposals Due.
June - All Applications Due.

Acquisition Grants

permanently protect important agricultural land under threat of conversion through the voluntary placement of conservation easements or purchase of property in fee.

No maximum - grant depends on program fund availability.

Multiple funding rounds. Please review NOFA for proposal and application deadlines.

No match funding required for tribes.

Tribal Capacity Building Program

Community Assistance for Climate Equity Program



About the program

The Tribal Capacity Building Program provides funding and technical assistance to California Native American Tribes, enhancing staff capacity to advance Tribes' climate- and housing-related work. Administered by the California Strategic Growth Council (SGC), the goal of the program is to help Tribes develop long-term capacity to secure funding and implement Tribal-led climate and housing projects.



The Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) and Application for Round 2 is now open as of May 11, 2026, and will close on **August 11, 2026**.

What does the program fund?

The program funds staff salaries and activities that advance Tribes' climate- and housing-related work. Activities may include planning, securing funding for, and implementing housing projects and related efforts to advance climate mitigation, adaptation, and resilience.

What services does the program provide?

Tribes work with a technical assistance provider and receive no-cost, flexible support that responds to each Tribe's needs. The capacity building and technical assistance services offered include, but are not limited to:

- Grant application & management support
- Planning & implementation assistance
- Staff & economic development
- Trainings & workshops
- Partnership building
- Peer learning

Who is eligible to apply?

California Native American Tribes listed on the Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC) Contact List, including federally recognized and non-federally recognized Tribes, are eligible to apply. A non-federally recognized Tribe is eligible to apply if it is registered as a nonprofit, a for-profit corporation, or a limited liability company. Tribally Designated Housing Entities (TDHE) are also eligible to apply.

What is the award amount?

The individual award amount is between \$350,000 and \$420,000, distributed over a three-year grant term. The total program award amount is \$5 million. This is a competitive grant program.

Pilot round Tribal grantees

In the first round of the program, a total of \$1.45 million was awarded to six pilot round grantees, with each receiving up to \$250,000 over a two-year grant term. The grantees represent both federally recognized and non-federally recognized Tribes across the State of California. The six grantees are as follows (in alphabetical order):

Tribal Housing Pre-Development Fund



About The Program

The Tribal Housing Pre-Development Fund is a grant opportunity that funds activities related to affordable housing development, including planning, infrastructure development, construction, site preparation, and other pre-development activities for California Native American Tribes and Tribal entities. The goal of the Fund is to increase preparedness for Tribes to build housing and access other state-funded, affordable housing programs.

The Tribal Housing
Pre-Development Fund
provides grants to Tribes to
advance their housing goals.

Who Is Eligible To Apply?

- California Native American Tribes listed on the Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC) Contact List dated February 2026, which includes both federally recognized and non-federally recognized Tribes.
 - Non-federally recognized Tribes are eligible if registered as a legal entity (nonprofit, for-profit, LLC) under California law and in good standing.
- Tribally Designated Housing Entities (TDHE) under 25 USC 4103 (22) which are listed in the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's National Directory of Tribes and TDHEs

What Does The Program Fund?

The program funds a variety of housing pre-development activities that respect Tribal knowledge, sovereignty, and expertise, including but not limited to:

Planning Activities

Community Needs Assessments, Feasibility Studies, Environmental Assessments, Market Analyses, etc.

Infrastructure Investments

Sewage and Drainage Infrastructure, Waste Management, Electric, Utility and Broadband Infrastructure, Sustainable Transportation Investments, Road and Safety Infrastructure

Site Acquisition and Preparation

Site Appraisal and Acquisition, Site Preparation, including Surveying, Grading and Mitigation, Architectural and Engineering Fees, Ecological and Wildlife Restoration, Disaster Preparedness

Other Associated Costs

Legal Fees, Consultant Fees, Staff Development and Training, and Staff Salaries

What is the application process?

The program will accept applications on a rolling basis, until funds are expended. The program currently has a total of \$20 million in funding. Tribes are eligible to apply for up to \$3 million. If funds are not expended, SGC will accept applications during a second application deadline. Applicants that are not awarded in the first round are eligible to apply for funding in the second round.

Note: SGC will not require a waiver of sovereign immunity from Tribes who are receiving funds on a reimbursement basis. However, requests for advance pay will necessitate federally recognized Awardees to sign a limited waiver of sovereign immunity.

Program Timeline

January 5, 2026

Draft Guidelines released for a 90-day Public Comment period and Tribal Consultations window.

April 29, 2026

Final Grant Guidelines approved by the Strategic Growth Council.

May 11, 2026

First Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) released, application period opens on a rolling basis.

August 11, 2026 at 5:00 PM

First application period closes, final date to submit revisions for consideration in first round of awardees. If funds are not yet exhausted, application period for second round will remain open.

October 29, 2026

First round of recommended awards will be presented to the Strategic Growth Council at a public meeting.

January 29, 2027 at 5:00 PM

If funds are not yet exhausted, second round of application period ends.

April 2027

If funds are not yet exhausted, second round of recommended awards will be presented to the Strategic Growth Council at public meeting.

Winter 2029 – Spring 2030

Grant term ends, deadline to disburse funds.
